Energy Industry-Impacted Roads

The Texas Transportation Commission has approved \$40 million for 19 maintenance and safety improvement projects for roadways used frequently by the energy industry. These include five local projects all beginning this summer: FM 1220 in Tarrant County, FM 3048 in Johnson County, FM 3325 in Parker County, SH 254 in Palo Pinto County and FM 730 in Wise County. Earlier this year, TxDOT formed the Task Force on Texas' Energy Sector Roadway Needs to develop long-term funding strategies and plans to address infrastructure concerns well into the future. In July, the task force of industry and government leaders met in Cleburne, their first assembly outside of Austin.

\$548 Million Allocated to DFW

Of the \$2 billion in additional funding identified earlier this year, \$548 million has been allocated to the DFW Metroplex. Fort Worth will receive \$130 million for I-35W from I-30 to I-820. Dallas will receive \$418 million for SH 31, SH 183 and I-35E. TxDOT partnered with metropolitan planning organizations, regional transportation organizations and districts to identify projects that focus on safety, congestion, maintenance, and statewide connectivity.

I-35W

A public hearing for I-35W from I-30 to I-820 was held on June 12. TxDOT is environmentally clearing the ultimate corridor which will widen I-35W up to eight main lanes plus four toll managed lanes. Concurrently, TxDOT and the region are proposing to fund interim improvements through a \$1.6 billion public-private partnership to rebuild 10 miles of I-35W from north of I-30 to U.S. 287 to double the existing capacity by adding four toll managed lanes, auxiliary lanes and some frontage roads. If all milestones are reached, this interim project could be complete by 2018. To view the visualization, go to:

To improve safety and traffic flow, TxDOT is reconstructing and widening the SH 26 corridor from four lanes to a six-lane divided roadway with raised medians. The project is being done in segments as funding becomes available.

Construction began in April 2010 on the Grapevine segment from SH 114 to Pool Road. Funded by the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act, this \$12 million project is scheduled for completion in spring 2013. Motorists were recently shifted to the new northbound lanes to allow construction on the southbound lanes.

In July, construction began on the next segment in Colleyville from Pool Road to John McCain Road for \$11 million. It is estimated for completion in summer 2014. Construction will proceed south to Hall-Johnson Road in 2015 when approximately \$11 million in federal funds is scheduled to become available. These segments are a partnership between the city of Colleyville, Tarrant County, NCTCOG and TxDOT.

SH 26 from Hall-Johnson Road to Cheek-Sparger Road is not funded for construction, but design is 90 percent complete and all but one parcel is clear for right of way. This segment may be considered for pass-through financing. SH 26 south of Cheek-Sparger Road is also currently not funded.

Meanwhile, TxDOT must maintain the existing pavement for the traveling public. These pavement improvements are necessary to accommodate traffic switches and detours during the expansion project. In April, work began to resurface SH 26 from John McCain Road to FM 1938. It will be reduced to one lane each way in two-mile phases during daytime off-peak hours to minimize the inconvenience to the traveling public. This \$4 million project is estimated for completion by this fall.




SH 26 in Grapevine

The Adopt-a-Highway program began in Texas in 1985 to give citizens an opportunity to help keep our roadways clean and beautiful. The program currently has more than 4,500 groups across the state. **Volunteers clean about 9,000 miles each year in the Adopt-a-Highway program — saving Texas taxpayers \$4.5 million a year.**


Demonstrating the value of a successful public-private partnership, the Texas-born grassroots movement now involves nearly 90,000 groups in 49 states, Puerto Rico, Canada, Great Britain, Japan, New Zealand, Australia, and Mexico.

The program continues to grow. In the last year, the TxDOT Fort Worth District has had a 38 percent increase in volunteers for its nine counties. In 2012, 2,937 volunteers from 157 groups adopted 351 miles. To become involved, contact Mary Hobson at 817-370-6534.

Litter Items Found on Texas Roadways



Adopt-a-Highway: dontmesswithtexas.org

FEDERAL *update*

In July, "Moving Ahead for Progress in the 21st Century" (MAP-21), was signed into law. The bill authorizes funding for highway and transit projects through FY 2014. Funding in

the bill was held static; however, there are multiple policy changes in the law that will assist states in moving projects ahead in a quicker and more cost-efficient manner.
